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On the 2nd April, most of us left our home: whether the families, to move to onshore accommodation, or Challenge Teams to their respective destinations. On the 5th of April our Dry Dock work phase began. This Dry Dock, part of the annual legal requirements for the Logos Hope work took place over 6 weeks in Yiu Lian Shipyard, Hong Kong.

This year, as well as the regular certificates and maintenance that needed to be done, the propellers and tail shafts were taken out, cleaned of barnacles, painted and put back in place. This process is done once every five years to meet legal requirements.

Playing soccer with monks (Myanmar)



Together with Glenn, a local Christian, crewmembers Tobias Schüßler (Germany) and Lena Goncalves (Brazil) went to local shop owners to pray for them. They were invited into the home of a woman named Lorda, and after being asked what they could pray for, she broke down in tears. Lorda, age 30, told the group how lonely she was, since her parents died and her husband left her alone with her sick son. "I really need God, I am not just saying it, but I really need Him!" But she felt that God could not accept her because of her mistakes and doubts. Tobias and Lena told

Sometimes it's difficult onboard letting them have the freedom and the space to just play like that.

Enya learned to ride a bike, Maya conquered potty training while

Ariana mastered the scooter. Wendy learned how to cook meals with only a microwave, a rice cooker and a sandwich toaster. She had to get creative, but quite enjoyed the challenge:) Dan enjoyed the simple pleasure of commuting in and out of work—it was almost like being normal (if traveling to and from a Hong Kong shipyard can be considered normal!)



Carpe Diem (Hong Kong)

Wendy: Just before Dry Dock, I had taken the kids to a playground. As usual, they started playing with the other children while I started chatting with one of the other moms (Phoebe) at the park. She asked where we were from and then I told her about the ship. Phoebe was interested since she lived in an apartment building near the wharf. Her son had been asking about the ship they could see from their window. I invited her

to the ship later on that evening and she came with her kids. I was able to show her around and get to know them a bit more. After many attempts to get together before Dry Dock, we invited them onboard for an Easter egg hunt with the ship kids. The next day they took us out for Dim Sum (traditional meal). There was some great conversation, ending with Dan talking to Edmund, Phoebe's husband about spiritual things. After the 6 week Dry Dock,

we returned to this same wharf for 1 day and so were able to leave an Apologetics book and a gospel of John with them which Edmund said he would read during his holidays. Please pray God would continue to speak to this family though this book and His Word.




God's interruptions are not always convenient
